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
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BUSY SPRING AND SUMMER


Director's Corner



with the Lord as the plane he was flying crashed and burned. Thankfully, with the Lord's help MATA has continued to train and see its pilots go to many places across the globe. On May 11, 2014 Alaska missionary pilot Dave Penz passed away after several years of fighting cancer. He

raised his family in villages along the Kuskokwim and Yukon Rivers. While living at the village of Stony River (which runs into the Kuskokwim at that place) he built Camp Inowak at a nearby location. Through this camp many were reached for the Lord. In 1980 he began developing an old gold mine site (400 miles West of Anchorage and 6 miles North of the Yukon River) into Kako Retreat Center.

In 1988, some two years after his wife died, he married a widow of more than 30 years who had spent most of her life as a missionary in Alaska. Vera, now widowed again, plans to continue on in this ministry that has touched the lives of thou-

sands of folks from the villages. In 2002 I flew my 4-place Cessna 182 to Alaska to help fly kids from their villages to camp so they could hear about Jesus, and I kept returning year after year. We continue to send a plane and pilots each summer to help with this wonderful ministry at Kako.

The MATA-THON fundraiser brought in \$8,000 to help cover avgas expenses for MATA's Cessna 182 which was used again to fly kids

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graduates Ian Rojas and Jonathan Miller left May 19th from MATA's hangar in Arlington to fly to Alaska. Jonathan was able to give Ian a checkout at Kako and some of the village airstrips before he returned home. Ian carried on and was able to help fly folks into Kako for Dave's memorial service, making 26 landings that day. A few days later Bible camps for kids began. Ian flew a total of 160 passengers and added 90 hours to his logbook. We could not have done this without your help. Thank you for all who contributed.
